

Nobody expects the IA inquisition – African Adventure

Sophia Razak has lived in IA for all her 16 years. She went to Edlesborough School then Sir Henry Floyd Grammar, where she has just entered the Sixth Form after stunning GCSE results. A linguist and musician, Sophia is preparing for a new and exciting adventure, heading off next summer on a World Challenge expedition to southern Africa.

Rikki: Which countries will you be visiting and what will you do?

Sophia: We are going to South Africa, Lesotho, Swaziland and Mozambique for a total of four weeks. We will have the opportunity to explore the countries, find out about their culture and, most importantly, help with projects that will improve people's lives. We will liaise with World Challenge personnel over the precise nature of the projects. I am particularly looking forward to tracking endangered whale sharks off Mozambique – they are the world's largest fish.

Rikki: How many of you are going from the school?

Sophia: We will be in three groups of twelve, each group acting fairly independently. Everybody will get the chance to lead their group for a day, making decisions on what is done, what we eat and so on.

Rikki: How much training will you have to do?

Sophia: Quite a lot. We need to work well as a team. In October, we will be camping and hiking in Snowdonia for a weekend. This will be important preparation for me, as I'm not exactly a "hiking person"! We have been told that we will have just £3.60 per head to spend on food and that we must decide on our menus. That means that compromises will have to be made, which will help the team building (I hope).

Rikki: It should also be good practice for managing your budget at university! How much do you have to raise for the expedition itself?

Sophia: Each person has to raise £4,350. If we manage to raise more, it will go towards supporting projects in these countries, so it is very worthwhile. I have already raised £2,500, a lot of that from the afternoon tea sessions that several people in the parish have kindly attended.

Rikki: Wow! You are well on target, then, but how can readers help more with this very worthwhile adventure?

Sophia: I will be holding a Christmas fayre at Moses Cottage on 25th November (2pm – 8pm) and 26th November (2pm – 6pm). There will be market stalls, games, carol singing and instrumental music, and plenty of food and mulled wine. Also, I will soon be taking orders for cake selection boxes and, in spring, I will organise some more afternoon teas. Rikki: Good luck, and I will be back to you this time next year for a report on how you got on. That reminds me, I said the same to Cameron Burchell before his expedition to Malawi. Cameron, I know you now live in distant Northall but, if you are reading this, please get in touch!

Every contribution was important. It's great when a village comes together in support of such an enjoyable and worthwhile occasion. Ivinghoe Parish Neighbourhood Development Plan

A public consultation was held in lvinghoe Aston Village Hall on 12th September between 3pm and 9pm and repeated in The Hub, lvinghoe on the 13th September. This followed the publication of the Draft Plan on the Parish Website and a summary of the plan policies delivered to every household and posted to relevant stakeholders. At the time we indicated that a period of six weeks would be then available for people to comment on the plan either via the web site, to my email address or to the ballot boxes placed in the Post Office, lvinghoe and the Village Swan, lvinghoe Aston.

Following this a copy of the draft plan was submitted and subsequently discussed with an officer of AVDC. Points raised by her have been addressed as follows.

- The gist of the plan, its objectives and its policies remain the same.
- Many of the descriptive words describing how the plan was developed etc have been condensed and moved to an appendix to shorten the plan into a working document.



- Some of the wording and presentation has been changed to conform to the phrasing and style which is more acceptable in a planning framework.
- The title of the document has also been changed from "Draft Plan" to "Presubmission Plan"

Following a second meeting with the AVDC officer we have a couple more points to address, the document can then be presented formally to AVDC and other interested parties. Although we do not need to re-present it to the public as the actual gist of the plan remains in place, we do however, by law, have to allow a complete six weeks from this formal presentation. The time scale for comments will therefore be extended to the end November.

Once the complete changes have been accomplished we will publish the revised format of the document on the Parish Website.

Ivinghoe Speedwatch

Many Ivinghoe and Ivinghoe Aston residents may have seen the Sentinel speed camera out and about on its travels. The camera is not out there to catch speeding motorists but to educate drivers to adhere to the speed limits. It is only those

motorists that fail to adhere, that get caught and consequently are reported to Thames Valley Police for further action.

NOT SO SUCCESSFUL

We are seeing evidence that some motorists would rather not be educated but lose their licence as we consistently see repeat offenders



Myth – 'In a queue of vehicles it is the first one that will get caught'. Wrong, all vehicles in the queue that are speeding will be caught.



The Sentinel speed camera operated by trained and authorized Ivinghoe Speedwatch volunteers.

The camera can be about on any day, at any time, at any of the nominated sites in the area.

Myth – 'I can drive on the opposite side of the road to avoid being picked up by the camera'. Wrong, the camera catches the whole width of the road. Please don't attempt this, you could also be prosecuted for dangerous driving

For those that do get caught, the police will initially send a warning letter. For those caught subsequently within the Thames Valley Police area, namely Bucks, Berks and Oxon, the police will take things further. The visit of a uniformed policeman in a marked car to discuss your driving is an experience few would want.

Once reported, vehicles are also checked for Tax, MOT and Insurance. Again, if missing, the likelihood is that a policeman will come calling.

Myth – 'The camera can only pick up vehicles in the direction of travel towards it'. Wrong, the camera can pick up and record in both directions simultaneously.

Mick joined me for a chat, together with Bar Manager, Damon, and another bloke. To preserve his anonymity, let's call him Malcolm and not mention that he's Chairman of the Neighbourhood Plan Committee. Rikki: Are your customers mainly from lvinghoe? Mick: Yes, we have a really great bunch of locals, including several clubs: photographers, knitters, book readers, bridge players, cheese lovers, share buyers, ladies wot lunch, walkers, cyclists and so on. There's great trade from Town Farm during the summer, too. On one





occasion we had 85 people eating at once. **Rikki:** Do you allow children and dogs in?

The ensuing discussion was lengthy, but I can summarise by saying "yes" to both, although I rather got the impression that the latter were preferred. Half portions are available (for children, not dogs). **Rikki:** What are your ambitions for the pub? **Mick:** There's an opportunity to increase the lunch-time trade and the ale trade. The food is all absolutely fresh and very reasonably priced. Nothing too fancy, but not `cheap and cheerful'. ► **Rikki:** Damon, you're the ale man, tell me about your selection.

Damon: We have five pumps: two standard brews, two local guests and one national guest. We have a very small cellar and can't lay casks down. Instead we use a vertical stacking system. I've won awards for keeping real ales and I'm proud of that, but I'm a St Miguel man, myself.

Rikki: So, Malcolm, you're a regular, give me an overview.

Malcolm: It's undoubtedly a very friendly pub. The staff are lovely and welcoming. It has a small but very nice outdoor area as

well as a homely, well-maintained interior as you can see. On top of that, the food and beer are excellent. What more could you want from a pub?

Rikki: Amen to that. Cheers!



Remembering in Silence

n Sunday 12th November there will be a service in St Mary's lvinghoe at 10:30am which will build up to a one minute silence at 11am. This tradition began in this country in 1919 when King George V asked that "in perfect stillness, the thoughts of everyone may be concentrated in reverent remembrance".

Many of us will know how the cries of grief at the news of the death of a loved one give way to an extraordinary stillness. We have seen how as the feelings of loss take hold sobbing subsides into deep silence. One hundred years ago, in 1919, at the 11th hour of the 11th day in the 11th month the silence must have been unimaginably deep after the deaths of so many in the First World War.

People of faith will know the silence of God, a disconcerting stillness that confirms atheists in their disbelief and which can dent the faith of believers. It was silence that descended like darkness around Jesus when in the throes of his own violent death he pleaded with God, "Why have you forsaken me?". Then heaven was silent.

But what sound would God make? And if he did cry out who would be able to stand the sound of his wailing? Would anyone who experienced his grief have words to describe it?

Yet in our common silence we will, if just for a moment be mindful of all who either dead or alive, bear the scars of battle. We will remember them and you are invited to join us and make our stillness all the louder at this or any other act of remembrance.





Ashridge Rambles – what are friends for...

hen the Ashridge Estate was first acquired by the National Trust in 1926, it was managed by a local management committee, which employed an agent to carry out its wishes. Over time, as the National Trust began to employ its own staff based on the estate, the role of the committee diminished and it took on more of an advisory role. The Ashridge Estate Committee is one of just a handful of local committees that has survived into the twenty first century and includes representatives from each of the parishes that border the estate. I represent lvinghoe, but have been invited by the committee to produce a brief news update for inclusion in any of their parish council magazines. In this issue, the update concerns Friends of Ashridge.

For many years, anybody could become a Friend of Ashridge for a small subscription, and hence keep in touch through an excellent newsletter produced twice a year. Friends also helped with the organisation of a range of fund-raising events. For a variety of reasons, the formal structure of Friends of Ashridge ceased at the end of 2015. The Ashridge Estate Committee recognised, however, that many people wish to support Ashridge without necessarily being active volunteers and, therefore, Friends of Ashridge has been retained as an entity. Friends provide valuable support to Ashridge through a £10 annual fee and, in return, receive a colourful and informative annual

AVDC urges residents to respond to voter registration forms

Aylesbury Vale District Council (AVDC) will be sending out annual voter registration reminder forms and is asking residents to respond as quickly as possible in order to help save money.

All properties in Aylesbury Vale received a 'Household Enquiry Form' in early August, but so far over 27,000 households have yet to respond. Residents are required by law to confirm or update the details of anyone at their address who is eligible to vote in the UK.

The forms are pre-printed with the names of the occupants currently registered to vote at each address. A response is required, either to update their details if there are any changes, or to confirm that the information is still the same. Even residents who voted in the General Election will need to respond.

Although the canvass response rate to date has been encouraging, over 30 per cent of homes in the Vale have yet to respond. Those households who do not respond to the reminder have to be personally visited, which is an expensive exercise. AVDC are urging residents to help us save money wherever possible by responding to their reminder form promptly."

Residents can respond online using a unique 14 digit reference number which is printed on the form. The online process also allows people to add the names of any new occupants as well as remove



names of those who no longer live at the address, or request a postal application. For further information, visit www.aylesburyvaledc.gov.uk/canvass or call 01296 585701.

Unitary update

The proposed rationalisation of our local government/councils from a 3 tier to a 2 tier organisation has apparently not made any progress since early summer. The current arrangements is 3 tier, i.e. The Parish/Town Councils. The District Councils and The County Council (Bucks CC). It is proposed as a result of consultancy study, to merge the three southern districts ie Chilton. South Buckinghamshire and High Wycombe to form the southern unitary and the fourth district council AVDC to become the northern unitary. This would result in a 2 tier arrangement with the existing Parish/ Town Councils and the new northern unitary (name to be decided!). We can only conclude that the Brexit priorities are all consuming and not allowing central government time to deliberate on

local government issues.

For your information, Dorset may well get the go ahead soon but only because its member authorities are in agreement with the way forward. Unfortunately, Buckinghamshire isn't in that position so will probably have to wait until sometime in the future for a decision. Currently the four districts agree with the result of the consultation but BCC does not.

Vale of Aylesbury Local Plan – VALP

The VALP (the VALP is the district equivalent to our Neighbourhood Plans) is progressing well and will go to scrutiny on the 26th September and targeted for completion and submitted to the Secretary of State in January 2018.

AVDC can now demonstrate it is meeting the governments housing number requirements which gives the planners a stronger position to negotiate conditions with developers for future building projects.

The Vale of Aylesbury Local Plan latest –

- **1.** It needs to plan for about 27,000 new homes by 2033 though around half of these are either already built or have planning permission
- **2.**Almost two-thirds will be built in and around Aylesbury as part of the Garden Town vision
- **3.**Other growth areas are Buckingham, Haddenham and Winslow as the next most sustainable settlements
- **4.**We are exploring the potential of housing at RAF Halton once it has closed in 2022
- **5.**There is also a large housing development site going ahead at Salden Chase on the edge of Milton Keynes.
- **6.**Smaller levels of growth are planned at villages, a lot of which have

neighbourhood plans in place or in progress. Neighbourhood plans have allowed the community to have a say in how their area develops and where growth should go.

7.At present a new settlement is not being proposed. This may change in a future Local Plan review, once we have a clearer understanding of the government's intention for the eastwest expressway between Oxford and Cambridge

This is an incredibly complex plan, which will affect the Vale for generations to come, and getting it right is the priority.

Housing Developments in the Vale

During early September the planning committees were invited to view the new development in Kingwood, Aylesbury, this is the massive building sites in and around Broughton Crossing. This will make available in excess of 2000 homes. What is interesting is the approach by the building company to engage with local environmentalist and the RSPB (Royal Society for the Protection of Birds). Usually they are in conflict! The outcome is the design of the 'estates' where the geography is being utilised to create water features including a nature reserve to benefit wild life. Also, the houses are built with bat boxes, swift 'holes' and house martin nests in addition to hedgehog and badger passage ways. This is not only good news for the wild life but it appears this is a positive selling point. If you are passing this location you may be interested enough to call in the sales office and collect some of their leaflets. that describe the venture, could be

useful for the more local developments to illustrate what is possible.

HS2 Information and HS2 Act FAQs

HS2 have recently published their Community Engagement Strategy which is now live on the GOV.UK website.

It sets out HS2s approach to community engagement and what it means for those who either live or work within the communities along the line of the new railway. The strategy will help support the thinking, actions and decision making of both our people and our supply chain. HS advise that this is very much the starting point and the next level is to finalise HS2s Local Area Engagement Plans that are specific to each local area. These will be published in the coming months.

A frequently asked questions document has been written relating to Schedule 17 in the HS2 Act 2017. Schedule 17 in the Act puts in place a process for the approval of certain matters relating to the design and construction of the railway. This document can be found attached.
