Roads and Bridleway

Buckinghamshire Council has informed us that they plan to resurface and plane and patch Ivinghoe High Street, Ivinghoe outside Brookmead School and Maud Janes Close junction at the end of February.

The Ivinghoe Safety Scheme is due to be installed by Transport for Bucks during the School summer holidays. As always please check our website **www.ivinghoepc.org.uk** and Facebook page for updates.

Ivinghoe Parish Council continues to pressure Buckinghamshire Council to repair 'cow corner' in Ivinghoe Aston and is working with Buckinghamshire Council on possible traffic calming measures for Ivinghoe Aston.

Ivinghoe Community Speedwatch volunteers remain very busy and have

been supported by visits Thames Valley Police Safety Camera in Great Gap. Thank you to all the volunteers that make this work.

The bridleway between Ivinghoe Aston and Ivinghoe has been cut back by Buckinghamshire Council, after months of pressuring Buckinghamshire Council we thank Buckinghamshire Councillor Peter Brazier for supporting Ivinghoe Parish Council with this.

Ivinghoe Lawn

New saplings have been planted in the area behind the Scout Hut in Ivinghoe Lawn. The saplings were a donation from The Woodland Trust and have been planted by John Groom and William Bamber, thank you to both and we look forward to watching the saplings and grass seeds develop in this newly restored area.

Ivinghoe Aston Park

The Brownlow Café in Ashridge has kindly donated a picnic table to the play area in Ivinghoe Aston for residents to use. The Woodland Trust has kindly granted Ivinghoe Parish Council 120 saplings which will be planted to

reinforce the hedge at the boundary of the park and will encourage wildlife, these are expected to be delivered in March.

Buckinghamshire Council - Reporting Problems

Please use the FixMyStreet app to report potholes, fly-tipping, fallen trees and any other problems with the Highways.

Buckinghamshire Council also have a Report It facility through their website **www.buckinghamshire.gov.uk**, you can use this to directly report problems with Rights of Way (Footpaths and Bridleways) in the area.

Dog Mess

Unfortunately, there has been an increase in the amount of dog fouling on lyinghoe Lawn and on footpaths in both lyinghoe and lyinghoe Aston. Please remember this is illegal and there are fines of £1,000 for anyone found allowing this. Ivinghoe and lyinghoe Aston both have dog bins for your convenience.

Fly Tipping

Fly Tipping has increased in Ivinghoe Aston, Ivinghoe Parish Council works with the Buckinghamshire Enforcement Team and we know they are having success tracing the waste and finding the offenders.

Buckinghamshire Council

Buckinghamshire Council invite your comments on the Ivinghoe Area Freight Zone Traffic Regulation Order (TRO). The purpose of this order is to reduce Heavy Goods Vehicle (HGV) traffic in the Cheddinaton, Ivinahoe and Mentmore area. This is the first TRO of its kind in Buckinghamshire and is the result of 3 years of research, monitoring, discussions,, public engagement and detailed planning. The original proposals have been amended to extend the eastern area of the proposed weight restriction zone up to the B440. This amendment was made upon conclusion of a previous consultation where this amendment was heavily suggested in the comments and responses.

Our wholemeal flour is much sought after.

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





Ivinghoe **Speedwatch**

he Thames Valley Police Speed Camera Van was Spotted in the vicinity at least 3 times in recent weeks...

Speedwatch within the lyinghoe parish is very much an educational tool. Its primary aim is to educate speeding drivers that speed within our communities is not tolerated and is there to help protect the community from speeding vehicles.



The education program works in a 3 stage process

Step 1. Community Speedwatch teams report any speeding vehicles to Thames Valley Police, who in turn send out educational letters about their speed to the owners of the vehicles. Vehicles reported as speeding over the police criteria are also warned that their speed could have meant a trip to the magistrates court if it had been reported by a police officer. Habitual offenders can also be put on a police watch list.

Checks are also made by TVP against Tax. MOT and Insurance databases and offenders are dealt with accordingly.

During the recent Covid break, Community Speedwatch has been upgraded. Until recently each police force had its own Speedwatch and they never overlapped but with effect from December 2021 Speedwatch has gone national.

Step 2. Once a site has been identified as being bad for speeding, the local police team will come down and do supplementary speed checks. The educational program at this point is escalated and speeding drivers could end up with points, fines, etc.

Step 3. If the local police team cannot resolve the speeding issues, then the Roads Policing team get involved, namely the TVP camera van. Depending on the nature and seriousness of the speeding the camera van visits more often.


The fact that the camera van has been seen at least 3 times and twice within a week tells you how seriously TVP are taking the speeding issues around the Ivinghoe area.

Yvingho Tales

St Mary the Virgin Church, Ivinghoe 27th & 28th November 2021

Take a cold winter's night, a church lit by frosty moonlight, a choir straining at the leash to be freed from the penal servitude of the pandemic, a bunch of strolling players ("strolled" up from Slapton), a wee folky band of fiddle, accordion, pipes and flutes, tambours and bells, and a true story from the depths of the thirteenth century, when the village of Ivinghoe was content in its smallness, and happy as it was, but big in the plans of a power-hungry bishop, one Peter de Roches, keen to increase the prestige and influence of his diocese. Then add local author and playwright Dave Sivers to fashion and hone the story in the style of Chaucer's Canterbury Tales (very fashionable at the moment with Zadie Smith's The Wife of Kilburn at The Kiln). And, finally, introduce Judith Sheridan, long-time Music Director and conductor of the Beacon Choir, who has composed and arranged a score at once medieval (somewhere between the school of "Notre Dame" and "Sumer is icumen in"), with drones and parallel fifths and modal melodies, but also sprightly folky elements, incorporating themes of the period, adapted for the choir, others newly composed but always with a healthy dash of contemporary choral writing thrown in, and you have the ingredients of an intriguing evening's entertainment. As the plot winds its way through euphoria to disappointment, to rebellion, then disaster, and fially to redemption, we are on a roller coaster of emotions. Using different textures, such as "industrial" percussion in the building sequences, and a terrifying textural effect as dozens of disparate tuneless voices whisper of the burning of the crops, the trees, the wildlife, and most of the village including the half-built church, the full tragedy of the villagers is felt. When finally, one Bishop Richard de Chaseport comes to the rescue and funds the building of the church which still stands today, the relief is palpable! Congratulations to all involved, The Beacon Choir, The Slapton Players, the tireless band of musicians, expertly marshalled and directed by Judith Sheridan, Dave Sivers for the vibrant text, all ably assisted by imaginative lighting and sympathetic sound.

The Bishop of Bedford blesses the new Tring School building

n 8th December, Tring School was delighted to welcome the Bishop of Bedford to bless the new school building. The Rt Revd Richard Atkinson was accompanied by the Head Students, school governors, members of the school Leadership Team and the Reverend Jane Bannister.

The Blessing was carried out by Bishop Richard on the middle floor of the three storey atrium which forms the new dining room in the school. After the Blessing the group toured the whole of the enormously impressive new building.

The contract to design and build the new school was awarded in the summer of 2019 with planning permission being granted in January 2020. The project kicked off on-site in March 2020 and of course we all know that was the month that the global Covid pandemic was declared.

The entire construction programme has been carried out against a backdrop of lockdowns, restrictions on travel, school one way systems, mass testing, Brexit, school closures, HGV driver shortages, remote learning for students, resource and labour shortages etc etc. The context could hardly have been more unusual and challenging.

Remarkably, despite the myriad of obstacles and unforeseen circumstances, the construction has been completed on budget and on time. Items are being decanted from the old school and the temporary classrooms into the new building over the Christmas break. The

building will be officially handed over to the school on 6th January 2022 with students returning on 11th January.

The final phase of the programme is the demolition of the original school followed by the landscaping and construction of a new car park to be completed by the summer of 2022.

The building is very attractive with a brick frontage within which is a large in-laid cross. The windows are large and obviously double glazed. The sides and rear of the L-shaped building are a mixture of bricks and light grey render with occasional dark red panels to reflect the school colours. The unusual design is highly effective.

The inside of the building is even more impressive. The classrooms, laboratories and all of the other teaching rooms are very spacious with large windows to allow maximum natural light. The corridors and stairwells are wide and allow a two-way flow of staff and students. The dining room is an atrium at the heart of the school. The four court sports hall is larger than a normal school facility in order to meet the Sport England specification for a number of sports at national level. The activity studio is equally impressive and includes a large skylight to allow natural light to flood in. The Learning Resource Centre and the Sixth Form are on the second and third floors respectively and both enjoy fantastic views towards Tring Park and Wendover Woods.

Every single teaching space will benefit from new and high quality ICT equipment.

The front of the new building will be significantly further back from the road thus reducing the impact on the local community; this has been a key element in the exterior design and landscaping.

The planning, design and construction of the new school has literally taken years to reach this point. The Government funding was first awarded in 2015 but due to the challenges caused by the configuration of the site it wasn't until late 2018 that the ball began rolling in earnest.

The final cost of the project is about £30m making it one of the largest projects of its kind in the UK. The school has invested nearly £1m of its own money to increase the size of the sports hall and to create dedicated spaces for pastoral support and mental wellbeing.

Alongside the construction of the new building, the school has invested over £350k on the refurbishment of the retained Beloe block. All of the teaching spaces in this block will have an identical configuration to those in the new building. This includes a state of the art 86 inch interactive screen in every room.

The school is also hoping to invest in many other new items such as cricket nets, dining room furniture, outside green spaces, high quality audio/visual in the dining room and the activity studio, outdoor furniture, a boulevard of trees,

sports equipment and a whole load more.

None of this comes cheap and the school's The Big School Fit Out fundraising campaign is just over half way to reaching its target of £50,000. If you would like to support the school, please visit **www.rocketfund.org** and search for Tring School.

The new school building looks fabulous, both inside and outside. It will be tremendous for the students, the staff and the entire community of Tring. The school is already considered outstanding in many areas and the new building with so many new and innovative facilities will take it to another level.

The new sports hall has a "pulastic" floor and will be a magnificent addition to the facilities readily available in the town of Tring. The two storey high activity studio has a mirrored wall, ballet barres, a partially sprung beech floor and a state of the art sound system. Both of these facilities are available for community use during evenings, weekends and school holidays. They are integrated with the 25m swimming pool to form the Tring Sports Centre. Ivinghoe Allotments

News from the **Allotment**

am writing this in that period between Christmas and New Year's Eve. which no one knows what to call (Twixmas), but as you will be reading this in February, the star on the tree will have faded, as will the memory of mince pies and tinsel. You may by now have suffered dry January, moist January and/or Veganuary and to dampen the mood further I will let you know that my Christmas potatoes failed and I blame Jack frost. My celeriacs were all show on the surface, but offered absolutely no substance underneath, which necessitated a quick emergency dash to the farm shop to offset any danger that my family would go without their celeriac soup with truffle oil on Christmas day, an apparently unforgivable omission.

That's enough gloom for as February begins, it brings the promise of Spring to come.

Sarah Raven says that 'February can be a very mixed month weather-wise, from sunshine warm enough to take your coat off, to snow or heavy, freezing rain. On good days, take time to get out into the garden to work and look around.

If the ground isn't too frozen or waterlogged, you can dig over the soil, or turn the compost if you have any. Tidy away any debris on beds and the lawn if it isn't too wet or frozen to walk on. Get organised and buy all the seeds and

compost you're going to need for the coming months. '

During January I do try to sort my seeds by sowing month and clean out the greenhouse. I do this so that from February onwards, especially when the weather is inclement, I can sow my seeds (I particularly love to do this when the rain is lashing down, the heater fired up and a podcast is playing). The first seeds I'd take care of would be broad beans, early leeks, first early peas, beetroot and even tomatoes (if in an area of blight, plant blight resistant). Seed potatoes will be in the shops by then. These will need chitting so, as Ernie said in his February 2021 article, save those egg cartons.

March and April (early Spring) can be a tricky time of the year. If the lengthening days entice you into a false sense of security, you may regret it if a cold snap brings chilly nights and frost. So if you decide to sow anything outside, please make sure that all tender plants are covered with a fleece to protect against a cold snap attack. You should also dig out any remaining winter crops such as brussels sprouts, cabbages, celeriac, kale, etc, which will otherwise bolt or deteriorate. To replace these, I sow courgettes, carrots, outdoor cucumbers, radishes and summer squash.

One of the other things to sow in the

greenhouse (or even on your windowsill) in early spring is sweetcorn. But what should you do once you've harvested the corns and all that's left are the stalks? Russell, who has a lovely allotment with a beautiful willow fence, has written a piece which will help rid you of your old sweetcorn plants.

'I was lucky enough to enjoy a day as a Zookeeper at our local zoo (ZSL Whipsnade) in mid-October. Great fun all day, but what I did notice when leaving the rhino area was a pile of old sweet corn plants. These are woody and difficult to compost for gardeners. Apparently large mammals – rhino and hippo – love them and are offered alongside a balanced diet as 'Browse'. Essential a little fun snack. So, I grabbed my old plants and a few from other



allotments and brought them back to the zoo later that week. The photos show my journey.' from allotment, waiting at

the security gates for a keeper, until we arrived at the Hippo headquarters. As I left, I snapped a final shot of the hippos outside in their enclosure. I'm sure I saw them licking their lip (do Hippos have lips?). So, if you have a few sweetcorn plants left over next year (once you've eaten the delicious corn), let Simone know and we can arrange for these to go to a great home. I promise the hippo and rhino will be very grateful'.

As I am writing this just after Christmas and you are reading it when the last of the sprouts are ready to dig up, here is a really delicious recipe for deep fried Brussels sprouts (I know because I have made it) from James Martin:

Ingredients: 400 Brussels sprouts, 1 kohlrabi, ¼ bunch parsley, 250g extra virgin olive oil, 50g Sherry vinegar, 1tsp Dijon mustard, 1 small garlic clove thinly sliced, zest of ½ orange.

Hazelnut Mayo: 2tbs chickpea water (from tins), 1tsp rice vinegar, 1tbs 100% hazelnut paste (or praline or Nutella), 1tsp Dijon mustard, 300mls veg oil

Method: Brussels sprouts: Wash (if necessary) and cut the Brussels sprouts in half. Dry thoroughly. Deep fry in a deep fat fryer or shallow fry in a large saucepan at 180 degrees until dark brown (about 2-3 mins) the centre should still be green.

Remove from the oil and place in some kitchen roll. Season with salt.

Pickled Kohlrabi: Mix the oil, vinegar, Dijon, garlic and orange together until it emulsifies. Peel and cut the Kohlrabi into quarters and slice it thinly. Chop the parsley and sprinkle on the kohlrabi. Cover with the dressing.

HazeInut Mayo: Whisk the egg yolk and vinegar for 30 seconds then add the Dijon and hazeInut paste and keep whisking. Slowly add the oil whilst whisking to form a Mayo. If too thick, add a few drops of cold water. Season.

Roast a handful of whole hazelnuts for 5 minutes at 175 degrees. Break them up and add to the dish at the end.



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
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Ashridge Ramblings – Farewell and thanks to the Brownlow Café

Buckinghamshire Council announces 2022/23 budget proposals

Buckinghamshire Council has published its proposed budget for 2022/23 showing how it plans to balance the books amidst an extremely challenging financial environment.

Buckinghamshire Council has published its proposed budget for 2022/23 showing how it plans to balance the books amidst an extremely challenging financial environment.

While many other councils are struggling to meet the financial pressures, Buckinghamshire Council can balance its budget whilst continuing to allocate funds to key projects residents have asked for. However, this is only possible by making some difficult funding choices.

All councils are operating in a highly uncertain financial landscape, coping with significantly increased demands on services, alongside the added pressures of the Covid pandemic, whilst seeing reduced funding streams from areas such as car parking and leisure centres. In Buckinghamshire we are managing many competing challenges, from higher costs, because of inflation, to the financial pressures many of our key providers are facing. It's also a big challenge recruiting and retaining staff in vital areas such as social work, where we need to be able to offer competitive wages to hire and keep staff in these critical roles.

Our prudent financial management through these challenging times means Buckinghamshire is in a positive position of being able to bring forward plans to balance the books while still delivering the service improvements in areas our residents have asked us to prioritise, such as committing over £100 million to roads and pavement improvements and our plans to open a new Household Recycling Centre in the north of the county.

As with all local authorities, the biggest budget pressures come from those services we are legally required to provide, particularly social care for

both Adults and Children. Overall, 57% of our net budget is spent on these services. In total we budget to spend approximately £295 million on social care services in 2022/23. Protecting the vulnerable and helping those that need the Council's services the most is arguably the most important work we do. We need to balance this alongside spending on the biggest priorities for our residents, like roads and pavements maintenance and improvements, tackling climate change and supporting our residents and businesses to build back from the pandemic.

It means difficult choices are being made and the budget proposals include the following ways of raising the necessary revenue for 2022/23:

- Increasing Council Tax in Buckinghamshire by 3.99% (a rise of £1.23 per week for the average Band D property). This includes a 2% precept to help pay for Adult Social Care
- Reducing some of the funding for our sixteen Community Boards
- Continuing the significant savings being made as a result of becoming a single unitary council
- Using a one-off sum of £1.36 million from the General Fund to balance the budget and mitigate risk in 2023/24

Making these decisions allows the Council both to balance the books (a legal requirement) and still continue many key projects such as:

- Fighting Climate Change by planting more than half a million new trees in Bucks, one for every resident
- Again next year, cleaning out every one of the 85,000 gullies in the county
- Spending more than £100 million on

- our roads and pavement improvement programme
- Enhanced street cleaning in local communities – part of our 'Big Bucks Tidy Up' programme

Our capital budget spans the next four years and proposes spend in the following key areas:

- £37.9m to support Economic Growth & Regeneration
- £136.4m on schools, and school improvement projects
- £117.9m on overall transport and Strategic Highways maintenance including i) £61.6m on major highway resurfacing schemes; ii) £17.7m on smaller planned surface repairs (known as 'Plane and Patch' repairs); iii) £8.5m on pavement repairs; iv) £8.4m on Street Lighting repairs, replacement and maintenance; v) £8m on drainage works to reduce flooding on our roads
- £120.5m on Strategic Infrastructure
- £24m investment in Waste, primarily on vehicle replacement and a household recycling centre in Buckingham
- £21.7m to support Housing and Homelessness including affordable housing action plans and disabled facilities grants

Buckinghamshire Council runs a robust and through budget scrutiny process, going further than many other councils to offer its residents the chance of hearing directly from councillors about the budget plans and giving residents the chance to question, challenge, and feedback direct through public budget scrutiny sessions which will begin on Monday 10 January. The details can be found on the Council's website at the meetings calendar page.

The Council's Cabinet has approved the plans at a meeting earlier today (Thursday 6 January).

Buckinghamshire Council awards Household Recycling Centres contract to FCC Recycling

Buckinghamshire Council has awarded the new contract to manage and operate its nine Household Recycling Centres to FCC Recycling (UK) Ltd. The contract is due to start on 1 April 2022 and run for five years with the option to extend a further five years (ten in total).

Buckinghamshire's Household Recycling Centres attract over a million visits a year and handle more than 60,000 tonnes of waste. FCC Recycling (UK) Ltd, which manages the current contract for Buckinghamshire's Household Recycling Centres, was agreed as the successful bidder, subject to contract, at the council's Cabinet meeting in December.

The new contract is worth £15 million over five years rising to £28.5 million over ten years if the contract is extended. Some elements of the successful bid include:

- Partnership with South Bucks Hospice to ensure more waste is reused from all sites through the shops at Aston Clinton and High Wycombe
- A Waste Awareness and Education Manager to support residents and the wider community to recycle and reuse more
- A target of recycling at least 68% of the waste brought to the sites

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

 unless on private-land then report to mailbox SCRAPflytipping@buckinghamshire.gov.uk
 Fix My Street reports for public land are sent automatically to the right clean-up team, which helps us a lot, and all FMS reports are copied to the Enforcement Team including images and location map.
- If you see someone fly-tipping please don't put yourself at risk don't interfere, just take details
 (they might take the waste somewhere else to dump it with no witnesses if you shout at them!)
- Report details incl vehicle registration index, location, date and time to mailbox SCRAPflytipping@buckinghamshire.gov.uk
- No need to put yourself at risk taking photos, but always helpful if you're able to do so safely
- Householders must by law use only a registered waste carrier (or council waste removal service)
- We ask everyone to insist they pay online which is far more traceable than cash
- Please make a note of the waste carrier vehicle registration index just in case
- Householders will be viewed as witnesses (rather than potentially defendants) in Bucks if they make traceable payment (not cash) even if their waste is fly-tipped



- Use someone you find to take your waste away not someone who "finds you" don't use 'man with van' who knocks at your door unrequested
- Most of the waste which is fly-tipped in Bucks is brought in from elsewhere (mainly London and Slough)
- 2/3 of fly-tipping is trade waste (which means someone paid a waste carrier to take it away) and not a resident stupidly dumping their own waste



- On average there has been more than 1 dumping conviction per week for 10 years in Bucks
- Average total offenders pay at court is £1,875 (includes both dumping and duty of care failure cases)
- Fines have increased since 2014 Sentencing Guidelines came in
- Re-offenders are much more likely to be caught and will be at a higher risk of a prison sentence (to a maximum of 5 years)
- Buckinghamshire Council receives back over 70% of the investigation and clean-up costs for fly-tip court cases back to Council bank accounts
- Never be tempted to add items to fly-tipped waste this would be viewed as fly-tipping (by you!) and a 'Zero Tolerance' policy applies
- Household waste is free to take to the Household Recycling Centre, aka 'the dump' (includes fridges, mattresses, sofas, household black bag excess)
- 'Household waste' usually means the things you would take with you if you
 moved house, plus plant based garden waste full details at:

- Waste management has never been 'free' there are always costs, sometimes paid by taxation
